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Rule Changes 2022

Please, see highlighted in each department for changes.

2022 General Rules and Regulations

- 1. Exhibitors are limited to 4-H and/or FFA members meeting 4-H age guidelines enrolled in club work in Van Buren County.
- 2. Exhibitors must have completed 4th-12th grade (or equivalent) of the completed school year 2021- 2022. FFA members who are in collegiate FFA may exhibit if eligible until age 21.
- 3. All exhibitors are required to wear the 4-H/FFA t-shirts provided by the fair board with blue jeans (*NO SHORTS*) and full shoes (*NO SANDALS or FLIP FLOPS*) when showing and during the sale with only exception being Horse exhibitors see horse department and Iowa 4-H Horse Book
- 4. There is to be absolutely NO changes done to the 4-H/FFA t-shirt provided by the fair board. (The sleeves are not to be removed and/or the hem length is not to be altered.) Our goal is to have all members appear the same. The 2021 shirt can also be worn *unaltered* during exhibition.
- 5. SHOES MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES IN THE BARNS
- 6. All helpers must be current and active Van Buren 4-H/FFA members or an active collegiate FFA member.
- 7. All entries must be made on fair entry by July 2nd.
- 8. With the exception of animals sold in the Livestock Sale, the release time for all animal exhibits will be 8:00 A.M., Sunday, July 24th.
- 9. All premiums will be forfeited if exhibits are removed early unless authorized by fair board.
- 10. All 4-H and FFA projects must be entered in the name of the owner or immediate family
- 11. All exhibits shall be developed during the current year.
- 12. It will be the responsibility of any exhibitor who becomes eligible for any special awards to notify the County Extension Office for assistance in claiming the award within 30 days after fair.
- 13. The Van Buren County Fair board will sponsor premium money.
- 14. All placing of division exhibitors will be made in Blue, Red, and White groups, with premiums paid on a straight basis. We do not pay premiums for the following: Showmanship, Kruse Single Selection, Horsemanship, County Born and Raised, Sheep Lead. Premium Values are the following: White \$1, Red \$2, Blue \$3.
- 15. When a protest is made, it must be in writing and signed and filed with the fair board secretary within 24 hours of the incident causing the protest. There will a \$25.00 filing cost payable to the fair board that must be paid when the protest is made. If necessary, arbitration of disagreements will be made by a committee of 3 4 members; consisting of Fair Board members, County Extension Staff, 4-H Committee, and the Division Superintendent. The fair board secretary will be present to record the findings. When a call of the judge is questioned it must be done before the judge leaves the fairgrounds. The fair board will not consider a protest, complaint or appeal based upon the statements that judge or judges are incompetent. ALL DECISIONS ARE FINAL!
- 16. 4-H/FFA members desiring to stay on the grounds overnight MUST obtain a permission slip from the fair board secretary. Form must be returned to fair board secretary with parents' permission no later than 9:00 P.M. No one under age 8 may stay overnight unless with a parent. Youth must have a parent signed permission form in presence of fair board secretary or other officer, officer will initial the form.
- 17. A 4-H member must have attended 6 activities with a minimum of 3 being club meetings. Any member not meeting this requirement will be asked to serve six hours of community service at the fairgrounds or will be barred from exhibition. Each case will be reviewed by an extension council representative, county youth coordinator and 4-H leader.
- 18. An FFA member must be in good standing and meet all state and local requirements.
- 19. Any disruptive person may be removed from the fairgrounds.

2022 LIVESTOCK RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. All animals must be in place by Wednesday July 20th at 6:00 pm.
- 2. Southeast Iowa Showdown is scheduled for after fair. Market animals attending may sell the ribbon during the livestock auction. This option is only for market animals attending showdown.
- Non-weighed in animals may begin entering the grounds Tuesday, July 19th 5:30-9pm and 2:00 -6:00 pm, Wednesday, July 22.
- 4. Market Beef, market lambs, meat goats, and swine will be weighed at the fairgrounds on Wednesday, July 20th, 8:00 am 12:00 pm (noon) and 3:00 pm to 5:30 pm.
- 5. Weight taken on weigh-in day will be used to calculate the ADG.
- 6. Individuals shall not exhibit the same animals in both 4-H and FFA
- 7. Stall/Cage fees will be charged for the 2022 Fair, see fairboard page 3.
- 8. Grooming chutes will be allowed in the designated grooming chute area only.
- 9. If the member is unable to exhibit animals, they may select another eligible Van Buren County 4-H or FFA member to exhibit for them in the show ring.
- 10. When showing livestock an exhibitor may receive assistance from another Van Buren County 4-H/FFA member when more than one animal is to be in the show ring at the same time.
- 11. If an animal becomes unruly in the show ring, the show superintendent will instruct the exhibitor to either 1) tie the animal to the side of the ring to be judged or 2) leave the ring and be disqualified from the show class.
- 12. If an animal becomes unruly, disruptive or the committee deems the animal out of control, the animal will return home. A.) This animal cannot return to the fairgrounds for any reason. B.) Animals must be exhibited to be allowed to participate in the livestock auction.
- 13. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation in animals exhibited will be considered as fraud and deception.
- 14. No powder or coloring agents except on the hooves will be allowed. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition. Projects, which show evidence of this (except for hooves), will not be permitted into the show ring. Animals will be scrutinized at the check-in area. If a color or coloring agent rubs off an animal rubbed with either a towel or hand, that animal will not be permitted in the show ring.
- 15. All animals are to be groomed by the exhibitor as much as possible, with assistance from family members, another 4-H/FFA member or a 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor. Help must be done as an educational component meaning the exhibitor must be in attendance watching and participating in the process.
- 16. The Breed Champion Ribbon will not be awarded in Classes where there is only one entry. The Division Superintendent reserves the right to combine livestock classes if there are less than 3 head to make a good class.
- 17. Order of judging will follow order in fair book/or market animal weight groupings.
- 18. Showmanship classes-the superintendents will decide when showmanship is, see each department. Senior showmanship (grades 9-10-11-12) followed by Intermediate showmanship (grades 7-8) and then Junior Showmanship (grades 4-5-6). If there are more than 15 entries in any showmanship class, we may subdivide the class. Animal type will not be considered except as it may affect the way an animal should be fitted and shown. Members competing must show his/her animal that has been entered in 4-H or FFA division classes.
- 19. <u>ALL</u> gates brought in by exhibitors MUST have approval by the department superintendent before the gate may be used.
- 20. NO water buckets, pans or tubs are to be dumped in the barns.
- 21. There will only be 1 fan allowed per family per species unless approved by the division superintendent.
- 22. All animals will require ear tags or tattoos for identification and stall assignment. All animals to show at the county fair must be identified in 4honline or ID'ed with the FFA Advisor by May 15th. Ownership of animals is determined at weigh in time of animal.
- 23. All 4-H exhibitors exhibiting livestock must sign and abide by the Code of Ethics Form in 4honline.
- 24. All exhibitors showing livestock must have an up to date YQCA by July 1st
- 25. Clover Kids will not be allowed to exhibit animals in the 4-H/FFA Shows. Clover Kids will not be allowed to participate in the Livestock Auction.
- 26. Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.
- 27. No extra swine, sheep, goats or cattle will be allowed on the fair grounds. ONLY ANIMALS SHOWING WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE GROUNDS. The only exception would be any open division classes that are haul in haul out shows.
- 28. For rules on intact males, please see each animal department. All males showing in the market classes MUST be steered, wethered, or barrowed by that species perspective weigh-in date.
- 29. Any questions and/or problems in an animal barn are to be addressed to the superintendent of the barn.
- 30. Morning chores should done by 8:00 a.m. and evening chores should be done by 6:00 p.m.
- 31. Superintendents will assign tack pens for exhibitors
- 32. Winners Photos for livestock will be taken immediately after the show. If you cannot make the photos please have someone take them and submit them to the office by July 30th. Horse Photos will be taken prior to the horse show of all horse exhibitors, however only winners photos will be published.

THE FAIR VET WILL MAKE DECISIONS AND THEIR DECISION WILL BE FINAL! IF THERE IS A DECISION BY THE STATE VETERINARIAN, IT WILL BE OFFICIAL.

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LOCAL 4-H AND FFA EXHIBITIONS!

All livestock must enter through the North gate of the fairgrounds.

An Official Health Certificate is recommended, but not required All 4-H/FFA livestock.

. If you plan to show in any of the Open Livestock classes a Health Certificate is REQUIRED for these shows. K-3 Shows are considered Open Shows.

A Vet will inspect ALL animals prior to unloading or shortly after at the fair per IDALS and the State of Iowa Veterinarian

Exhibitors must turn these in before they may show in any class.

All market animals (Beef, Sheep, Swine, and Market Goats) must have a signed and completed drug affidavit turned in before Noon on Sunday July 24th.

NOTE:

Any evidence of warts, ring worm, foot rot, pink eye, draining abscesses, or any other contagious or infectious condition will eliminate the animal from the show.

DEPARTMENT 1 BEEF CATTLE

Kaye Gilbert– Superintendent Sandi Coffman-Extension Liaison

Judging will be held on Saturday, July 23rd

- 1. NO water tubs, containers or pans will be allowed to remain in the Breeding and Market cattle stalls. A SMALL water bucket may be tied into the bucket bottle stalls. The water bucket must be secured at all times.
- 2. An animal showing in beef classes may not be shown in dairy classes.
- 3. Native lowa cattle originating from a herd not under quarantine can be exhibited without other testing requirements.
- 4. 4-H members who exhibit 4-H Market Beef/ but do not exhibit in 4-H Breeding Beef classes, may, if eligible, exhibit in the FFA Breeding Beef classes. Likewise, 4-H members who exhibit in 4-H Breeding Beef classes, but not in 4-H Market Beef/ class may, if eligible, exhibit in the FFA Market Beef classes. Exhibitors in 4-H Market Beef classes may, if eligible, exhibit in the FFA Breeding Beef.
- 5. No powder or coloring agents except on the hooves will be allowed. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition. Projects, which show evidence of this (except for hooves), will not be permitted into the show ring. Animals will be scrutinized at the check-in area. If a color or coloring agent rubs off an animal rubbed with either a towel or hand, that animal will not be permitted in the show ring.
- 6. All animals are to be groomed by the exhibitor as much as possible, with assistance from family members, another 4-H/FFA member or a 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor. Help must be done as an educational component meaning the exhibitor must be in attendance watching and participating in the process.
- 7. Families are allowed only one tack pen in the Cattle Barn
- 8. Any questions and/or problems in an animal barn are to be addressed to the superintendent of the barn.
- 9. Stalls are to be cleaned daily of manure.
- 10. Stalls areas are to be cleaned before leaving the fair. No feed, hay, bags, bedding, or trash of any kind is to be left in the stall area or the barn.
- 11. Morning chores should be done by 8:00 a.m. and evening chores should be done by 7:00 p.m.
- 12. Exhibitors may sell 1 market beef through the livestock sale, the market beef must have been shown in its perspective class.

CLASS A-S – BREEDING BEEF AN EXHIBITOR MAY NOT HAVE MORE THAN 2 ENTRIES PER LOT FOR BREEDING BEEF

- 1. Breeding Beef classes are open to exhibitors of grade, and crossbred beef females and male calves. Classes will be determined by animal's sex and age.
- 2. All intact bull calves may not be born before January 1, 2022.
- 3. Date of birth of animals will be displayed on a card worn by the exhibitor during judging.
- 4. Heifers will be judged from the standpoint of breed characteristics, type, quality, and conformation, with emphasis on future usefulness as breeding cows.
- 5. A heifer weighed in at the December weigh in may be switched to a breeding animal as long as the animal is identified as a breeding animal by May 15. The heifer may not be shown in the market class if it has been identified as breeding stock on May 15.
- 6. There will be Champion and Reserve Champion within each qualifying breed division. One over-all Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected. In Divisions, where there are less than 3 entries exhibitors, may be asked to show in Other Registered Breeds Division.
- 7. Bucket calf classes are defined as orphan calves and are not nursing calves in cow-calf unit
- 8. The Grand Champion Breeding Female will represent Van Buren County at Showdown.

ALL REGISTERED BREEDING BEEF ANIMALS MUST BE REGISTERED WITH THE RESPECTIVE BREED ASSOSCIATION AND IN THE EXHIBITOR'S NAME OR THE FAMILY FARM/ RANCH NAME

For example If the exhibitor is Jane Smith and the calf is registered to Smith Family Farms, A family relationship is known. If the exhibitor Jane Smith has a calf registered to Cedar Hills Ranch, Proof that Cedar Hills Ranch is Jane's Family must be provided. Proof of registration must be shown on or prior to entry day or the animal will be shown as crossbred

Class T Bucket Bottle Calves

- 1. Calves must be identified on 4-H Online by May 15.
- 2. Calves identified as Bucket Bottle calves may only be shown in Bucket Bottle Classes.
- 3. A maximum of only two (2) calves may be exhibited at the fair.
- 4. Class is open to any newborn or orphaned heifer or male calf that is not nursing on a cow. Calves in a cow calf unit do not qualify for this class. Calf must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing is allowed.
- 5. Calf must be born between Jan. 1 and May 15th of the current year.
- 6. Calf may be a beef, dairy or crossbred.
- 7. A male Bucket Bottle calf may remain a bull, but he will not be eligible for any of the Return Bucket Bottle Classes the following year unless it has been made a steer.
- 8. Calves will be shown on a halter. Showing the calf will be according to beef showmanship guidelines with an emphasis on what the member has learned.
- 9. Entries will be weighed during fair weigh-in on Wednesday so member may complete their Records.
- 10. Those wishing to come back in the Return Bucket Bottle classes will be tagged and tag number recorded during fair weigh-in so they may qualify for the Return Bucket Bottle Calf classes the next year. The Member is to notify the Beef Superintendent if they wish to have the calves tagged.
- 11. Classes will be divided by age of calves and will be determined by the Superintendents depending on number of entries.
- 12. In order to be eligible for the Return Bucket Bottle Class the following must be completed: Record Evaluation, Interview with Judge, Show ring evaluation. If not all completed they will not be eligible to show in the return bucket bottle class.
- 13. Evaluation of the project will be based on
 - A. Record Evaluation 200 points
 - B. Interview with judge 200 points
 - C. Show Ring Evaluation 100 points
 - D. Total Possible Points 500 points

CLASS RBB - RETURN BUCKET BOTTLE ANIMALS

- 1. Animals must have been exhibited in the prior year in a Bucket Bottle Class.
- 2. Animal must have the original tag from previous year or the tag must be produced if it has fallen out. Tag numbers will be verified in previous year's records.
- 3. Return Bucket Bottle Market steers and heifers must have been weighed and ear tagged during weigh-in in December.
- 4. No horns are to be present on any market animal. All animals are to be dehorned and completely healed by weigh in, Wednesday, July 20th . Scurs will be allowed.
- 5. No intact males are allowed in market class. All males are to be steers prior to the December 28th weigh in
- 6. Classes will be designated by superintendents and classes may be combined.

 - Lot 2 Return Bucket Bottle Cow/Calf Class
 - Lot 3 Return Bucket Bottle Market Heifer Class

Class Z Orphan and Non Nursing Calves

- 1. Calves must be identified on 4-H Online by May 15.
- 2. Calves are to be identified as Breeding Beef not a Bucket Bottle Calf.
- 3. A maximum of only two (2) calves may be exhibited at the fair.
- 4. Class is open to any newborn or orphaned female or male calf that is not nursing on a cow. Calves in a cow calf unit do not qualify for this class. Calf must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing is allowed.
- 5. Calf must be born between Jan. 1 and May 15th of current year.
- 6. Calf must be a beef calf. No dairy calves in this class.
- 7. A male orphan/non nursing calf may remain a bull.
- 8. Calves in this class will NOT be eligible for Bucket Bottle Classes or Return Bucket Bottle Calf classes.
- Calves entered in the Bucket Bottle Calf classes are not eligible for this class. It must be one or the other, not both.
- 10. Calves will be shown on a halter and will be judged on conformity of the calf.
- 11. Classes will be divided by age of calves and will be determined by the Superintendents depending on number of entries.

CLASS V - Market Beef No More than 3 Animals May be Exhibited in this Class

- 1. All Market Beef projects are to be weighed at the scales ON THE FAIRGROUNDS on Wednesday, July 20th
- 2. Fair personnel will figure the average daily rate of gain from December 28th weigh-in date to July 20th and cards are to be made for each animal. All exhibitors will be expected to make their tags, which will be worn by the exhibitor in the ring. Exhibitors will also display this rate of gain on each stall card.
- 3. All market beef must have a 2.2-pound average daily gain from December to July 20th in order to receive a blue or purple ribbon. Any animal below 2.2 will automatically receive a red and will not be eligible to show for Champion or Reserve.
- 4. Weight and sex only will classify all Market Beef classes. No breed awards will be given to market cattle.
- 5. No horns are to be present on any market animal. All animals are to be dehorned and completely healed by weigh in, Wednesday, July 20th. Scurs will be allowed.
- 6. No intact males are allowed in market class. All males are to be steers prior to the December 28th weigh in
- 7. The winner of each weight class will be eligible to show for Grand Champion unless the animal did not have a 2.2 rate of gain. The remaining class winners and the second-place winner from the class in which the Grand Champion was selected will be eligible for Reserve Champion.
- 8. Steers weighing less than 900 lbs. and heifers weighing less than 850 lbs. will not be eligible to show for Grand Champion.
- 9. A heifer identified as a breeding animal on May 15th may not be shown in this class.
- 10. Market steers and heifers will be judged according to individual merit from market standpoint, taking into consideration conformation, quality, finish, and gain ability. Potential for future development will be a consideration in the placing of the Market Beef Calves class.

- 1. All animals entered in this class must have been born as well as raised in Van Buren County.
- 2. Documentation must be provided with the fair entry regarding birth place
- 3. Animal must be a market animal weighed in during the December weigh in date.
- 4. Animal may be a heifer or a steer. If necessary due to entry numbers, steers and heifers may be separated.
- 5. 1 entry per exhibitor

CLASS U—FARM BUREAU ULTRASOUND

The animals will be evaluated using a formula, which considers ultra-sound information & A.D.G. to determine pounds of lean muscle produced per days on test. The Van Buren County Farm Bureau Federation will pay for 1 animal per exhibitor per species. Example you want 2 cattle you will have to pay for the other.

Special Awards

Note: If you qualify for one of the following awards, notify the Extension Office with the necessary information.

- 1. The American Polled Hereford Association will donate a plaque to the champion Polled Hereford Heifer or Steer.

Please also bring a 4H/FFA tee shirt, if the weather is hot and the judge approves, a long sleeve button up shirt may be replaced by 4H/FFA tee shirt. Please see superintendent prior to show for dress attire confirmation. 4-H arm bands must be worn on the upper left arm or a chevron can be worn on the upper left chest. Failure to do so will result in disqualification. Superintendents will provide arm bands to all exhibitors prior to the show.
- 12. Helmets/Hats: In halter and showmanship classes (any class where the exhibitor is walking on the ground with their exhibit), cowboy hats are to be worn. In any riding class, the exhibitor is required to wear a helmet.
- 13. Location of show: the horse show will take place in the grandstand arena. In the event of bad weather, the show will be moved to the indoor show barn arena.
- 14. Individuals shall not exhibit the same animals in both 4-H and FFA.
- 15. A horse, pony or mule may be entered under ONE exhibitor unless 4-H 202 rule applies and must be designated by May 15th
- 16. A designated person will measure all ponies prior to the show. The height measured will be the show height.
- 17. The fair horse superintendents reserve the right to combine a class if there are insufficient entries to make a good class.
- 18. The fair horse superintendents reserve the right to subdivide a showmanship class if there are more than 15 entries.
- 19. The gate to the show arena will remain closed during all classes and timed events.
- 20. If the grandstand arena is used for the horse show, the regular pole bending pattern will be used for Class P, Pole Bending. If the indoor show barn arena is used for the horse show, keyhole will replace pole bending as there is not enough room in the indoor arena for a full pole bending pattern. There will be a 5 second penalty for each pole or barrel knocked over. A broken pattern will result in disqualification.
- 21. Abuse of horses will not be tolerated by anyone.
- 22. Any animal ruled unsafe or unsound by the fair veterinarian, judge or superintendent before or at any point during the show will be excused for the duration of the show. Decisions in this regard are final.
- 23. Horses will be inspected by Vet Prior to the show. Native Iowa horses may be exhibited without any testing including the Coggins test and EIA test.
- 24. 4th graders can show in the county fair, but are not eligible for the Iowa State Fair.
- 25. 2022 fair 4-H members may enter any of the Iowa State Fair classes offered without qualifying at the county level.
- 26. A member will be limited to 6 classes at the Iowa State Fair.
- 27. The use of mechanical hackamores and gag bits will be prohibited. Tie downs will be permitted in speed events only.
- 28. All stalls and/or trailer tie-out areas must be cleaned by exhibitor before leaving
- 29. Exhibitors in the 4-H Horse Department are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Horse Department or vice-versa.
- 30. Horse High Point will be awarded to the exhibitor in each age division with the most points. Points will be calculated the following: 1st place = 5 points 2nd place = 4 points 3rd place = 3 points 4th place = 2 points 5th place and each place after = 1 point Exhibitors will be recognized with an award at the Annual 4-H Awards Banquet or FFA Awards

EGG SHOW

- There is a maximum number of animals an Exhibitor can sell at the sale. Each exhibitor may sell a maximum of one beef, may sell a maximum of three swine, may sell a maximum of three sheep, may sell a maximum of three goat, may sell a maximum of five head of rabbits and may sell a maximum of five poultry.
- 2. The Fair Entry program will determine Sale order. Champions and Reserve Champions will be sold first. The top rate of gain and top ultra-sound winner will be placed on sale order following the champions, followed by individuals and their pens.
- 3. 4-H / FFA members will be paid for their livestock directly from the buyer. Income from all auctioned donated items will be paid directly to the Extension Office or FFA.
- 4. Please tell us, as soon as possible, who the buyer is.
- 5. Animals will be sold on weights calculated before sale time. No exceptions, except if the animals are sold by the head, (rabbits, chickens, etc.) Buyer must determine the destination of the animal at the item of the sale. (Locker, Keosauqua Sales, etc.)
- 6. Trucking will be provided to all buyers at no cost. All hogs will be sold for slaughter.
- Animals may be resold the night of the sale, through the sale ring. 15% of the resale will go into the 4-H Activity Fund or FFA Fund.
- 8. The auctioneer and superintendent of the sale will hold the final say in disputes of same bid
 The buyer has the option of separating a pen of animals and purchasing 1 or more animal members selling
 livestock should wear proper attire which is: 4-H / FFA t-shirts provided by the fair board with blue jeans (NO SHORTS) and full shoes (NO SANDALS or FLIP FLOPS)
- 9. All sheep, goats and beef must be led/haltered in sale ring. Animals are not to be released until handed off to sale personnel.

2022 4-H EXHIBIT HALL RULES, REGULATIONS & SCHEDULE

This department is open to youth who are participating in 4-H Youth Development Programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, or Iowa FFA: Van Buren- Harmony FFA Chapter.

- 1. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Iowa State Fair 4-H General Exhibit Rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.
- 2. All exhibitors are to wear the proper attire which is: 4-H / FFA t-shirts provided by the fair board with blue jeans (*NO SHORTS*) and full shoes (*NO SANDALS or FLIP FLOPS*) when in the presence of judge. The only exceptions allowed are the clothing event or the communications if a costume is part of the presentations.
- 3. Clubs may arrange their exhibits before or after the judging.
- 4. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'ers participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program.
- 5. 4-H'ers who have completed 4th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in the 2021-2022 year are eligible to exhibit.
- 6. 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2021-2022 are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th grade members.
- 7. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice-versa. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class. When an exhibitor is in both 4-H and FFA they should select 1 club to enter projects for that department. They may exhibit static projects FFA but it will not be considered for state fair, FFA has a separate nominating process for projects entered into FFA categories at the lowa State Fair.
- 8. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be disgualified and not put on public display.
- 9. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
- 10. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Game animals legally taken are acceptable. Live specimens of noxious weeds or invasive species are not permitted in any exhibit. Dried specimens are acceptable to use in exhibits
- 11. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.)
- 12. Along with conference judging, the 4-H'er's goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive verbal evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located on each 4-H project page at www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- 13. A written explanation, audio recording, or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
 - What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
 - What steps did you take to learn or do this? What were the most important things you learned?
 - ***Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for food and nutrition, photography, and visual art classes.
- 14. All judges' decisions are final.
- 15. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including the name of the county, class number, and exhibitor's name.
- 16. No entry fee is required.
- 17. All exhibits must reach the Roberts Building during your clubs assigned judging time on Tuesday, July 19th. Exceptions: Exhibitors participating in alternative evaluation/ educational learning experiences will enter exhibits as determined for program participation by Extension Council. Exhibitor MUST submit in writing why they will be absent to the extension office by July 1st.
- 18. All exhibits are to remain in place until Sunday, July 24th. Exhibits will be released from 8:30 AM on Sunday. State Fair Selectees will have their pictures taken Sunday at 10 am. If you cannot make this time please have someone take the pictures for you and submit them to the office by July 30th.
- 19. All exhibits must remain until Sunday, July 24th, RELEASE TIME: 8:30 AM- Noon on Sunday. If projects are going to lowa State Fair: Exhibitors are still required to pick up their exhibit.

Other Exhibit Information

Due to security, 4-H'ers are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit.

The Van Buren County Fair board and Extension Council will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and Placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by accident, fire, theft, etc.

Large projects selected for state fair will be required to be transported by the exhibitor/ family, if the family is unable to transport, the project will not be selected for state fair and an alternate will be taken.

Home improvement state fair rule: If your home improvement project is selected for state fair items entered must be ready for display in the home: pictured framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips, or other quick attached products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing. This is a 4-H member responsibility and not the responsibility of 4-H fair staff to prepare the exhibit for display.

Class Descriptions

Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements that will be included in the judging process. Members are highly encouraged go to www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets to find information about judging criteria for exhibits that they create from their 4-H project learning.

ANIMALS

10110 Animal Science - An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows the learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of any animal is not required.

10120 Veterinary Science - An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human health interaction, or other learning related to veterinary science

AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

This department will be judged by the ANR Judge.

Exhibitor may bring 4 exhibits per class in this department, exhibits must be different. For example, cannot bring 2 butterfly collections for the same class. You may bring a butterfly collection and an insect collection.

- **10210** Crop Production and Plant Science An Exhibit that show learning about the growth, use and value of filed crops, plant growth, soils, soil fertility, or any other learning related to Crop production and plant science. **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10220** Conservation, Environment and Sustainability An exhibit that shows connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat etc. **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10222** Entomology Any exhibit that shows learning from an entomology or bee project (including live specimens) that is an outgrowth or an entomology or bee project learning experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (honey) or equipment as part of the display. **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10224** Fish and Wildlife Any exhibit that shows learning about a fish and or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvests. Feral Pigs(including Russian/European boar) are not permitted in taxidermy exhibits **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10226** Forestry any exhibit including collection, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program 4 entries per exhibitor
- **10230** Horticulture and Plant Science An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department.) **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10235** Home Grounds Improvement An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc. **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10240** Outdoor Adventures An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities. **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10250** Safety and Education in Shooting Sports An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows). **4 entries per exhibitor**
- **10260** Other Agriculture and Natural Resources An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above. **4 entries per exhibitor**

CREATIVE ARTS

Exhibitor may bring 6 entries per class.

- **10310 Music** An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history. **6 entries per exhibitor.**
- **10320 Photography** An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video. **6 entries per exhibitor, will be judged by the photography judge.**

Photography Special Rules:

- 1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. They may be processed from negatives, slides, or digital cameras and computer manipulation programs. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
- 2. Photographs should be a minimum of 5" x 7". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11" x 14". Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
- 3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted
- 4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
- **5.** 4-Hers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size. **Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be** judged.
- 6. A series is a group of photographs or slides [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Slides should be numbered. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6" x 8".
- 7. Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
- 8. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- 9. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
- 10. Van Buren County Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
- 11. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice-versa.

10340 Creative Photography - A single photograph or photographic image that has been created with an alternative photographic process, or a photograph that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple overlapped photographs.

Alternative/Creative Photography Special Rules:

- 1. Photograph/Image may be mounted/matted or submitted digitally. IF submitting digitally please bring it on a flash drive, or email it to Jennifer Plowman CYC jbathje @iastate.edu.
- 2. Photograph/Image can be created from film negative, digital negative, or digitally manipulated in computer. If mounted: exhibitors in this class may now submit creations as a digital image. Displaying as a printed work is still encouraged. Digital submission provide another option for member who may not have access to quality printing resources.
- 3. Photograph must be on photo paper, canvas, or other flat material, if printed.
- 4. Exhibit must have Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Include information about the processes used.
- 5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

10345 Photography Idea/Educational Display - An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. Youth who desire to explore digital photo displays (ex: online portfolios, galleries) can create an entry in class 10345 Photography Idea / Educational Display. This class includes photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, etc. as part of an educational display showing learning about printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc. 6 entries per exhibitor will be judged by the photography judge

10350 Visual Arts Original Art- An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is a one of a kind, non replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art. Maximum of 6 entries per exhibitor

10355 Visual Arts -Design, Process, or Technique Exploration — This exploration class emphasizes process and provides an individual the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must still be credited, acknowledged or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5. Maximum of 6 entries per exhibitor

10360 **Visual Arts - Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics** — Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc. **Maximum of 6 entries per exhibitor**

Visual Arts Special Rules:

- 1. Items entered must be ready for display in the home, gallery, or intended final display location: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing. Rationale: Visual Arts exhibits that are not an educational display are items intended for use/display in or at home (or a gallery). They should be a finished product, ready for use/display in the home. Exhibits entered at the lowa State Fair must be ready for display. This is a 4-H member responsibility and not the responsibility of 4-H fair staff to prepare the exhibit for display. This rule mirrors the requirement added to Home Improvement in 2021.
- 2. Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
- 3. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- 4. If the exhibit is a finished art object information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
- 5. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
- 6. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional information, see 4-H Exhibit Copyright Information at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/visual-art.

Class 10540 Digital Storytelling – is now cross listed in Creative Arts and Personal Development. Class number remains as 10540

FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCES

An exhibitor may bring 5 different exhibits per class in this department. For example Class 10440 Food and nutrition: Cannot bring 5 plates of cookies. You may bring drop cookies, cutout cookies, cake, yeast bread, and jam.

10410 Child Development – An exhibit that shows learning about children. Examples: childcare, growth and development, safety and health, children with special needs, and careers in child development. Exhibits include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit 2) what children learned from the use of the items in the exhibit. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by general FCS judge.**

10420 Clothing and Fashion – Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories - A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by clothing/sewing judge.**

10422 Clothing and Fashion – Purchased Garments & Accessories - Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by clothing/sewing judge.**

10424 Clothing and Fashion – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits - Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by clothing/sewing judge.**

Clothing and Fashion Special Rules:

- 1. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may <u>not</u> be entered as a 4-H lowa State Fair exhibit. You may enter it in county, however the awardrobe form is not acceptable, you must fill out an exhibit form.
- Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principals. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principals if appropriate for the exhibit

10430 Consumer Management - An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, and consumer rights and responsibilities. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by general FCS judge.**

10440 Food & Nutrition – Prepared Product- An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared food product. See food & nutrition special rules below and HS 76 Food for lowa 4-H fair- quick reference guide at www.store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional info regarding prepared food producst. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by food and nutrition judge.**

10442 Food & Nutrition – Preserved Product -An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See food and nutrition special rules below and HS76 Food for lowa 4-H fair-quick reference guide at www.store.extension.iastate,edu/product/6434 for additional info regarding preserved food products. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by food and nutrition judge.**

10445 Food & Nutrition – Educational Display - An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparation & service, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for lowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning & service must include a menu

Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

- Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- 3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- 4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- 6. The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- 7. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2021 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or lowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used.
- 8. Preserved food exhibits **must** include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
- 9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a reclosable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. The minimum number of food articles for an exhibit will be: 4-6 cookies-brownies, muffins, biscuits, 1 cake, 1 quick bread, 1 pie. After judging, 1 piece will remain for viewing.
- 10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

10450 Health - An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, safe activities and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and healthy lifestylechoices. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by general fcs judge.**

10460 Home Improvement - An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics. Must include information on how design element and art principals were applied. Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s)/designer(s)/artist(s) 5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by home improvement judge.

10470 Sewing and Needle Arts - Constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, or other items. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by clothing/ sewing judge.**

10472 Sewing and Needle Arts – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits - Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including but not limited to construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by clothing/ sewing judge.**

10480 Other Family and Consumer Science - An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any previous Family & Consumer Science class listed. **5 entries per exhibitor- will be judged by general fcs judge.**

10490 \$10 Meal Challenge – Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$10.

Rules

- 1. Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class.
- 2. All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
- 3. Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
- 4. The meal must serve four (4) people and total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$10.
- 5. The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5) food groups. a. Fruit, Vegetable, Protein, Grain, Dairy
- 6. The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size 20" x 30") that includes: a. the menu (including portion sizes) b. meal type (breakfast, lunch, dinner) c. grocery receipt(s) d. photos of the shopping experience, food preparation, and the meal e. Attach a copy of the \$10 Meal Challenge worksheet to the back of the poster.
- 7. Detailed guidelines and suggested resources to complete the \$10 Meal Challenge can be found on the Iowa 4-H \$10 Meal Challenge webpage: https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/10-meal-challenge-healthy-living

The Van Buren County exhibit form is not to be completed; the \$10 meal challenge worksheet is to be used.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

All classes will be judged by general fcs judge. 3 different entries per class.

10510 Citizenship and Civic Engagement - An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

10520 Communication - An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills in their many forms.

10530 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit - Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

4-H is... and Join 4-H.

4-h.org theme to "Find Your Spark".

Youth Conference theme to "Building the Future".

Iowa State Fair theme to: Find Your Fun (in 4-H).

Poster Communication Special Rules:

Only one poster per 4-H'er may be entered.

All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board - size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".

Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage.

Posters <u>cannot</u> be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may <u>not</u> extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.

Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.

Posters <u>cannot</u> use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the lowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.

4-H'ers may include the 4-H clover in the poster.

- **10540 Digital Storytelling** Any exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.
- 10550 Leadership An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.
- 10560 Self-Determined An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.
- **VB900 4-H History County only-** This class is designed to help participants gain a greater appreciation for and to focus on 4-H history. Any exhibit by one or more 4-H'ers and one or more adults which is an outgrowth of goal identified by participants. Topics might include: History of 4-H, History of a 4-H project, history of an educational experience, activity or club. **This will not be considered for state fair.**
- **VB904 4-H Record Keeping-County only-** Exhibit consists of 4-H member entering their project record and or a total record book. Member will participate in conference judging by asking about goals, accomplishment of goals and evaluation. This exhibit may be submitted and evaluated of a project completed at home physically unable to bring as an exhibit. Pictures not needed, an exhibit form still must be used. **This will not be considered for state fair**
- **VB910** Family Heritage- County only- This class is designed to help participants gain a greater appreciation for and to focus on history and family heritage. Any exhibit by one or more 4-H'ers and one or more adults which is an outgrowth of goal identified by participants. Topics might include: Family Heritage, genealogy, Iowa, County, Township or another historical item. **This will not be considered for state fair.**

VB915 Scrapbooking- County only- This class is designed to help participants gain a greater appreciation for the ability to record historical data through the use of clippings, pictures, keepsakes and any other item used to record an event or spot in time through creative designs. **This will not be considered for state fair.**

VB950 REUSE, **RECYCLE**, **and REPURPOSE** – **County only** Using anything recycled (no new items except for nails, glue, etc.) the exhibit should be turned into a functional or decorative item. Sample ideas include: making pencil bags from juice drink pouches or clocks from disposable ink pens. *INCLUDE INFORMATION ON*: How does my/our goal relate to the reuse, recycle, repurpose issue? What did I/we learn about this issue? What did I/we do to educate others about the issue? Information that could be included: before and after photos, list of materials and expenses, economic/environmental savings by reusing or reclaiming the item, etc. **This will not be considered for state fair.**

SCIENCE, ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY

All Classes will be judged by the SET judge.

An exhibitor may bring 9 different exhibits per class. Example class 10630 you may not bring 9 robots.

You may bring a robot, an aerospace exhibit, a computer exhibit, climate exhibit, GPS exhibit etc.

- **10610 Mechanics** Any exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.
- **10612** Automotive Repaired or restored s (Note: vehicles will be on display at the Iowa State Fair one day only, Thursday August 11.)
- **10613 Automotive** Educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems.
- **10614 Electric** Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

- **10615 Small Engine** Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.
- 10616 Tractor Repaired or restored tractor
- **10617 Tractor** Educational Display showing learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety.
- 10618 Welding Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.
- **10620 Woodworking** Any exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.
- **10630** Science, Engineering & Technology Any exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

Science, Engineering & Technology Special Rule:

- Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering & Technology classes may not enter in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice-versa.
- **10632** Aerospace Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic
- **10634 Robotics** Educational display or other exhibit (including working robots) that shows learning about robotics and robotic systems.

4-H HORTICULTURE DEPARTMENT

Only actual vegetable specimens, from the current crop year, are entered in this division and are shown. Any display depicting a concept, idea or learning process with a horticulture project is entered in Horticulture in the Agriculture and Natural Resources Department

Exhibitors are permitted up to two entries per class (except one entry per class in the division- Jumbos).

Specimens should be prepared for exhibit as stated below. Publication 4H-462 "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit", available online and from the local County Extension Office may be used as a reference. However, the number of specimens required per exhibit MUST match the class listing below. Incorrect numbers of specimens will cause the entry to receive a white ribbon.

All produce (including Jumbos) must be in exhibit condition to qualify for exhibition and placing.

Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name. If exhibiting an unnamed variety, use the term "standard".

Exhibition plates, bottles and special containers are the exhibitors responsibility to provide

It is the exhibitors responsibility to take care of their plants (watering etc.)

Each exhibit should be labeled as to species and variety of fruit, vegetable, herb, flower or house plant on a 3X5 card. Card will also include a record of the plant including planting date (for annuals), fertilizer (how much and when), care and harvest date.

40301 Vegetable Container Display - The vegetable display must include at least five but not more than seven different kinds of vegetables (from classes in Division 401/402 above) grown in the exhibitor's garden and will not include flowers, herbs, other ornamental or decorative items, or other plants. More than one variety of any particular vegetable can be displayed; however, not more than four items of the same vegetable can be displayed. For example, four tomatoes would constitute one vegetable, e.g., one large red slicing, one cherry tomato, one yellow tomato, and one processing tomato. The container display will be reduced one placing if it contains more than four vegetables of any one kind, e.g., more than four beans. The container display will be reduced one placing if it contains more than four specimens of any one kind of vegetable, e.g., more than four beans. The amount of produce exhibited should fit into the container and specimens may not overflow onto the table. The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H-462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit." Any decorative basket, box, or container, not larger than one-half bushel can be used. The exhibit will be judged 75% for the cultural perfection of the vegetables and 25% for decorative arrangement.

40302 First Year Exhibitor's Class - Plate of mixed vegetables exhibited by a 4-H member who has never participated in the lowa State Fair 4-H Horticulture Show before. Plate is to consist of one tomato, one onion, one pepper, and one each of two other vegetables of the exhibitor's choice from classes in Division 401/402.

40303 Salsa Tray - This tray must include vegetable specimens (grown by the exhibitor) to make salsa. The salsa tray must contain two specimens each of tomatoes, peppers, and onions. In addition, it must contain two specimens each of two other vegetables (from classes in Division 401/402 above) that are included in the salsa recipe. A copy of the recipe card must be included in the tray. The number of specimens must fit on the tray.

40304 Group Vegetable Platter – This platter consists of vegetables grown by at least two 4-H exhibitors who already are exhibiting vegetables in the other Horticulture classes (#s 40102 through 40648). Platter must include 5 different kinds of vegetables and must include 2 tomatoes, 2 onions, 2 peppers, and 2 other kinds of vegetables from the following list: 2 beets, 2 carrots, 2 cucumbers, 2 potatoes or 2 summer squash. The amount of produce exhibited MUST fit on the platter

40305 Vegetables of The Same Color Platter - This platter consists of 4 kinds of vegetables and/or herbs that are the same color (of the exhibitor's choice—from classes in Divisions 401/402/404). For example, a red platter could have red slicing tomato, red cherry tomato, red bell pepper and cayenne pepper; while a green platter could include green variety eggplant, green bell pepper, green beans, and green kohlrabi. There is no limit to the number of individual specimens; however, the amount of produce exhibited MUST fit on the platter. Platters will be judged 75% on exhibit quality and 25% on accuracy of hue and appearance. Each exhibitor may enter up to two color platters, but each must represent a different color group.

4-H COMMUNICATION EVENT PROGRAM- Steve Westercamp Superintendent

This department is open to youth who are participating in the 4-H Youth Development programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension.

All participants are responsible to read and comply with the lowa State Fair Communication Event program rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and specific program event rules and regulations.

PURPOSE: The Communication Event program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of developmental experiences for different age levels.

General Communication Event Program Rules And Regulations

- 1. 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2021- 2022 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share-The-Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking See event rules for age guidelines.
- 2. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibit may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class).
- 3. Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of his/her 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- 4. Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.
- 5. 4-H'ers must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
- 6. All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.

EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATION DEPARTMENT

Purpose: Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience in order to gain a desired response.

Educational Presentation Rules

- 1. Time limit: Junior Presentations (4th and 6th grade) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th 12th grade) must not exceed 20 minutes. Presenters will be verbally told to "STOP" when they exceed the time limit.
- 2. 4-H'ers may participate in Two Educational Presentations per year at the Van Buren County Fair.
- 3. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts of from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.

- 3. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed 6 minutes in length.
- 4. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment will be acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.

EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING DEPARTMENT

Purpose: Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

Extemporaneous Speaking Rules

- 1. Participants can be any age, but only senior 4-H'ers completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2021-2022 year can be selected to advance to the Iowa State Fair.
- 2. Each county may enter a maximum of two entries; individuals may participate once per year at the Iowa State Fair. Program format:
 - Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
 - The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
 - A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional
 participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the
 preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult or any
 other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
 - All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - Participant may bring his/her own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.
 - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H'ers own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
 - Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown time cards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.
 - The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by name and the club(s) he/she represents. The participant will be expected to introduce his/her speech by title only.
 - Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium not will be available.
 - Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
 - Content related to topic.
 - Knowledge of the subject.
 - Organization of material.
 - Power of expression.
 - Voice.
 - Stage presence.
 - General effect.
 - Response to questions.
 - A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included as a part of the program.

Purpose: Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to communicate with and tell a story or idea visually about 4-H to the general public using the non-verbal form of communication on a poster.

- 1. Three Clothing Selection participant Four participants total with no more than 2 participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume)will be eligible to represent Van Buren County in the Iowa State Fair
- 2. The purpose of this category is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H'er's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- 3. Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, attractiveness, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
- 4. There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of recordkeeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as a part of the process.
- 5. Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other second hand venues with a total price of over \$15. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-Her actually selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
- 6. Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.
- 7. Participants must submit 4-H Clothing Selection Report Form provide from the Extension Office. A photo must accompany the form.

CLASS B - FASHION REVUE

Lot 1 – Senior (9-12) Lot 2 – Intermediate (7-8) Lot 3 – Junior (4-6)

Fashion Revue Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).

- 1. The purpose of this category is to encourage the sewing of a personal garment or outfit.
- 2. Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, attractiveness, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care
- 3. Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
- 4. A garment or outfit consists of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to, party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats.
- 5. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.

- 6. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected
- 7. Participants must submit 4-H Fashion Revue Report Form provided from the Extension Office. A photo must accompany the form.

CLASS C - THE \$15 CHALLENGE

Lot 1 – Senior (9-12) Lot 2 – Intermediate (7-8) Lot 3 – Junior (4-6)

- 1. Four \$15 Challenge participants will be eligible to represent Van Buren County in the Iowa State Fair, with no more than 2 participants with an entry
- 2. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store or resale shop. (i.e. Goodwill, Salvation Army or other stores of this type)
- 3. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts that were selected by the 4-H'er belong in the Clothing Selection Class.
- 4. Cost of the outfit must be \$15 or less (including sales tax), not including shoes, accessories or undergarments.
- 5. Receipt (s) MUST be turned in with the \$15 Challenge Report Form.
- 6. Participants must submit 4-H \$15 Challenge Report Form provided from the Extension Office. A photo must accompany the form.
